



























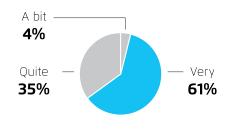

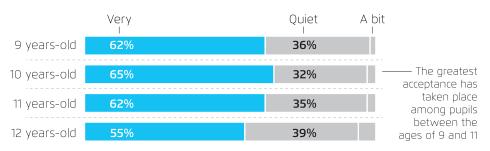
PUPILS IN PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS - 2018

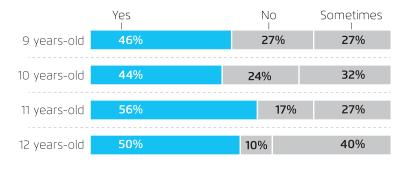

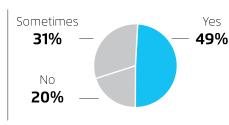


CAPABILITY TO DIFFERENTIATE LEGAL CONTENTS FROM PIRATED

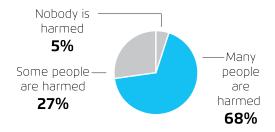

Some people think they do not harm anybody when the gain access to pirated contents. Do you think they are right?



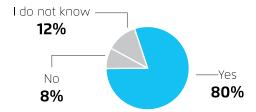

POSITION ON PIRACY

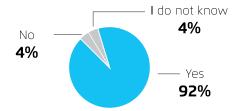
Do you consider that downloading / gaining access to music, books, films, series, football or pirated games is negative?

CONCLUSION

Half of the children and adolescents surveyed were not capable of clearly differentiating between safe, legal content and pirated content. 20% said they can even tell them apart.



47% of students aged 9 to 13 are interested in working in a profession related to creative processes.



80% of students between the ages of 9 and 13 **consider piracy as something negative**, and only 8% tend not to.



Children aged 9 to 13 share music (57%), video games (42%), films and series (27%), and sports and football (19%) on the Internet.



SOURCE: The study on AWARENESS AND ONLINE CONTENT CONSUMPTION HABITS IN PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL PUPILS is part of the awareness campaign "Defend Our Culture and Sport," which was funded by the Spanish Coalition of Content Creators and Industries and Latiga and conducted in schools by Argis Producciones. This campaign was carried out in 81 primary and secondary schools in several Spanish autonomous communities, with pupils in the fifth and sixth years of primary school and the first and second years of secondary school and of ages ranging from 9 to 13. 247 training sessions were held between 2017 and 2018, in which 14,371 pupils from Extremadura, Madrid, Andalusia and La Rioja participated directly.



SAMPLE: 1,000 pupils in the fifth and sixth years of primary school and the first and second years of secondary school, aged between 9 and 13. 49% were boys and 51% girls. The data was collected at different schools (public, subsidised and private) located in the autonomous communities of Madrid, Extremadura, Andalusia and La Rioja. Representation was sought for both urban and rural schools.
